March 1st Independence Movement

On March 1st 1919, after nearly a decade of Japanese military rule and forced assimilation, the Korean people stood together in strength, solidarity, resilience and courage to demand their inherent right to freedom, self-determination and nationhood. In Seoul, 33 Korean cultural and religious leaders read the Proclamation of Independence, marking the beginning of a courageous struggle by the Korean people for independence from Imperial Japanese rule. March 1st remains a historic day for Korea and a moment of pride and unity for Koreans around the world. It has become a national day to observe and reflect on the more than two million people who stood bravely together against forced assimilation, oppression and tyrannical rule.



On the Hill & In the community

February was full of Chamber sittings, many official meetings (of committees, Senate Leadership, BC Caucus, Senate Caucus, National Caucus, bilateral and special meetings), advocacy work and meetings with stakeholders on various issues and more. As Co-Chair of the Joint Committee on Medical Assistance in Dying, Senator Martin along with Co-Chair MP Marc Garneau and committee members from both Houses completed the final report for MAID (as well as sign onto a dissenting report appended to the main report, along with other Conservative members of the committee), and it was officially tabled in both Houses of Parliament. As Deputy Leader, Senator Martin continued to advocate for Canadians and hold the government to account in the Senate Chamber by questioning the Government leader on immigration, refugees and citizenship issues regarding service contracts, public safety and drug-impaired driving, agriculture and agri-food issues relating to fertilizer tariff and alcohol excise tax, and questioning the Minister of Labour about Career Extension Tax Credit and the rate of taxes on beer. In British Columbia, Senator Martin attended various meetings and events throughout February to support constituents, communities and organizations. February was a busy and productive month in BC as well as in Ottawa.
